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About Pro Arte Chorale

Pro Arte Chorale, an all-volunteer chorus now celebrating its 53rd season, is one of New Jersey's most prominent choral organizations. The Chorale has appeared in major concert venues across the region including the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Avery Fisher Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Carnegie Hall, and the South Orange Performing Arts Center. In addition to its own subscription series in Bergen County, the Chorale has appeared with the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, American Symphony Orchestra, Westfield Symphony Orchestra, Mark Morris Dance Company, and the New York Chamber Symphony. Currently under the musical direction of Steven Fox, the Pro Arte Chorale has also been conducted by Joshua Greene, David Crone, Roger Nierenberg, Bart Folse and John Nelson. In addition, the Chorale has sung under the batons of Nicholas McGegan, Zubin Mehta, Julius Rudel, Hugh Wolff, Zdenek Macal, Yuri Temirkanov, Leon Botstein, Gerard Schwartz, and David Wroe.



Conductor Steven Fox is now in his sixth season as Artistiwc Director of the Pro Arte Chorale. He is the Artistic Director of The Clarion Choir and The Clarion Orchestra, and Founder of Musica Antiqua St. Petersburg, which he established as Russia's first period-instrument orchestra at the age of 21. A 2017 GRAMMY[®]-nominee, he has appeared as a guest conductor with many renowned ensembles such as Philharmonia Baroque

Orchestra in San Francisco, Handel and Haydn Society in Boston, Juilliard415 at Lincoln Center, the Charleston Symphony Orchestra, the Quebec Symphony Orchestra, l'Opéra de Québec, Music of the Baroque in Chicago and the Tucson Symphony Orchestra. His performances have also taken him to some of the most prestigious halls internationally, such as the Grand Philharmonic Hall and Hermitage Theater in St. Petersburg, Russia, the Rachmaninoff Hall in Moscow, the Duke's Hall of London, and the Vatican.

From 2008 to 2013 he was an Associate Conductor at New York City Opera, and he has served as Assistant Conductor for the Metropolitan Opera Lindemann Young Artists Program and Juilliard Opera. He has also been Music Director of the Taghkanic Chorale in Westchester since 2007.

About the Artists

Recognized as a leader in his generation of conductors, Steven has been called 'an esteemed director' by *The New Yorker*, 'visionary' by *BBC Music Magazine*, and 'a conductor to watch' *by Seen and Heard International*.

Steven was named an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music, London, in 2010 'for significant contributions to his field in music.' He has given master classes and clinics at Dartmouth College, The Juilliard School and Yale University, where he served for two years as preparatory conductor of the Yale Schola Cantorum.



Janet Montgomery has won acclaim as a pianist, organist, coach, and conductor. She has appeared in concert at venues ranging from Carnegie Hall and the Kennedy Center to Washington National Cathedral, and the Juilliard School. She has accompanied such groups as the New York Choral Society, the Gregg Smith Singers, Musica Sacra, and the Masterwork Chorus. She is a founding member of the Serafini Brillanti Trio; the group

has recorded a CD and has performed extensively in New Jersey, Florida, and the Chicago area. Ms. Montgomery is the director of music at the Community Church of Glen Rock and is the accompanist and keyboard assistant at the Barnert Temple of Franklin Lakes. She is also on the music faculty of the Dwight Englewood School. Ms. Montgomery graduated from the Oberlin Conservatory with a bachelor's degree in piano performance and has a master's degree in accompanying from the Manhattan School of Music. She also holds the AAGO certification from the American Guild of Organists.



Dr. Christian Wilhjelm, conductor, professional musician and educator, has been the Ridgewood Concert Band's Musical Director since it was founded in 1983. He was also Music Director of the renowned Goldman Memorial Band in New York City. As a guest conductor, Dr. Wilhjelm has conducted the West Point Band, the United States Army Field Band, the Virginia Wind Symphony, the Allentown Band, the Hanover Winds, the Raritan Wind Symphony, and the Norwalk Symphony. Dr. Wilhjelm has been the conductor of the annual New York City Tuba Christmas since 2000. He was recently appointed the conductor of the Ramapo College Concert Band. As a French horn player, he has performed under the world's great conductors including Leonard Bernstein, Seiji Ozawa, Sir Colin Davis and Arthur Fiedler.

The New Jersey Wind Symphony (NJWS), in its 35th season, is one of the leading wind ensembles in the United States. Founded by community leaders, dedicated musicians and Music Director Chris Wilhjelm in 1983, the NJWS is committed to engaging and inspiring audiences with the finest in traditional and contemporary wind band literature. Led by Dr. Wilhjelm, the band is composed of professional, amateur and student players drawn from the tri-state area. Each year the NJWS performs a subscription series of concerts at their performance home in the West Side Presbyterian Church in Ridgewood, New Jersey.

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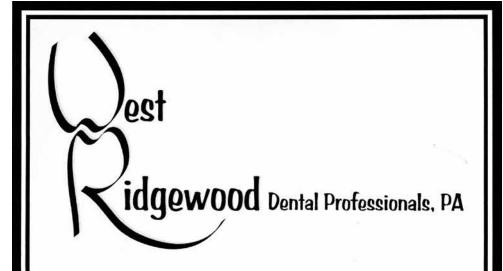
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Program Notes

Pärt – Bogoroditse Devo

Arvo Pärt's (b. 1935) "Bogoroditse Devo" is a vibrant tribute to the Mother of God. Sung in Russian Church Slavonic, it uses the same text as Stravinsky's "Ave Maria," the "Hail Mary" prayer. Born in Estonia, Arvo Pärt studied at the Tallinn Conservatory, worked as a recording engineer for Estonian Radio, and composed film music. He created his own compositional style called "tintinnabuli," music that imitates the sounds of bells. This piece, written in 1990, was commissioned by King's College Choir of Cambridge. It contains elements of Russian Orthodox chant, declamatory homophony (especially by the altos right at the beginning), and even recitative-like sections. Listen for the imitation of bells throughout, in various meters.

Sweelinck – Angelus ad Pastores Ait

This glorious motet by the Flemish composer Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck (1562-1621) captures the beauty of the late Renaissance motet. Sweelinck, the great Dutch composer, keyboardist, and pedagogue wrote this piece in 1619 as a part of a larger work, Cantiones Sacrae. Sweelinck uses Latin text from Luke 2: 10-11 to announce the birth of Christ. This same text would later be used by Händel in his Messiah some one hundred and twenty years later. The piece is a capella and scored for SSATB. Be sure to listen to the masterful counterpoint between voices and the joyful "Alleluia" section at the end.

Pinkham – Christmas Cantata

Daniel Pinkham (1923-2006) was an American organist, pianist, harpsichordist, and composer. He grew up in Boston and lived and taught in Massachusetts his entire life. He studied with teachers considered to be musical legends: Aaron Copland, Arthur Honegger, Samuel Barber, Wanda Landowska, E. Power Biggs, and Nadia Boulanger. His Christmas Cantata was composed in 1957 when he was Professor at Harvard University. He titled the piece Sinfonia Sacra, and in many ways, the piece is homage to the Baroque cantata as well as the Venetian choral and brass music of that time. Pinkham's Christmas Cantata contains three movements, all dealing with the story of the birth of Christ. In the first movement, we hear how the shepherds learn of the newborn Christ child. In the second movement, the animals tell the story of Christ's birth. Finally in the third movement, we hear a hymn of praise by the angels derived in part from the Gospel of Luke. The repeated "Gloria in excelsis Deo" serves as the theme of joy in this movement, followed by a dramatic "Alleluia". Be sure to listen to the antiphonal work between chorus and brass, the exquisite text painting, dramatic syncopations, modern harmonic language, and the fanfare-esque writing throughout.

Tavener – Hymn to the Mother of God

Composed in 1985, John Tavener's (1944-2013) "Hymn to the Mother of God" speaks of the cosmic power attributed to the Mother of God "in whom all creation rejoices" by the Eastern Orthodox Church. Tavener, a great composer of primarily religious music, converted to the Russian Orthodox Church in 1977. Its theology and traditions greatly influenced many of his works. Of Tavener, John Rutter said "Tavener has a rare gift. He can bring an audience to a deep silence." This piece is in three sections (A B A), and uses two choirs (SAATBB). Be sure to listen to the syllabic text setting similar to the style of Gregorian chant, the polyphonic imitation between the two choirs (there is a canon at one point), harmonic dissonances, and moments of unmetered and free rhythmic singing.

Stravinsky – Bogoróditse Dévo

Igor Stravinsky (1882-1971) once said "Music praises God…it is the Church's greatest ornament." Stravinsky was raised in the Russian Orthodox Church. After a brief period of being away from the faith, he returned in 1926 and became a regular congregant at a Russian Orthodox church for immigrants in Paris. In 1934 he composed this "Ave Maria", written in the Phrygian mode. The text is in Latin and based on the "Hail Mary" prayer. Be sure to listen to

the prominent bass line, the syllabic but also melismatic text setting (many notes per syllable), and the gorgeous Picardy third ending on an A major chord. Let this piece transport you to a Russian Orthodox church filled with beautiful icons of the Virgin Mary.

Vaughn Williams – The Blessed Son of God

Ralph Vaughan Williams (1872-1958) is considered to be one of the giants of English choral music. After Henri Purcell in the seventeenth century, Vaughan Williams was responsible for the revitalization of twentieth century English music. He, like Pinkham, studied with legends: Charles Villiers Stanford, Hubert Parry, then later Max Bruch and Maurice Ravel. He was the editor of The English Hymnal, documenting British folk song for two years and a major contributor to The Oxford Book of Carols. "Blessed Son of God" comes from the cantata Hodie (Today), written in 1954 when Vaughan Williams was 82 years old. The texts come from The Bible, The Book of Common Prayer, as well as English carols and poems. The words are by Miles Coverdale (1488-1569), an English cleric who made the first complete translation of The Bible. Be sure to listen for the chorale texture of the piece, similar to that of the Passion chorales of J.S. Bach as well as the repeated "Kyrie Eleison", which ends each stanza of text.

Gabrieli – In Ecclesiis

Giovanni Gabrieli's (1555-1612) "In Ecclesiis", written in 1577, is considered one of his most famous choral works. Gabrieli wrote this piece while organist and music director at St. Mark's Basilica in Venice. It is a piece designed to be performed in the Basilica, as the Eastern Byzantine architecture of the building had a profound influence on Gabrieli's writing. The piece calls for musicians and choirs spatially separated around the Basilica creating a polychoral antiphonal texture. The piece is in a rondo form (a repeated Alleluia chorus is sung between each section) and the text is sacred, but not liturgical, emphasizing redemption and healing through penance. Some believe its first performance was around 1575 for the passing of the plague. Be sure to listen for suspensions and dissonances to create tension and excitement, virtuosic melismatic singing, and for the distinct sections of the piece either for soloists, multiple choruses, or brass choir.

Rachmaninoff-Bogoroditse Devo

Sergei Rachmaninoff's (1873-1943) "Bogoroditse Devo" comes from a larger a capella piece entitled All Night Vigil (Op. 37). It contains settings of texts from the Russian Orthodox All Night Vigil ceremony. The entire work was composed in less than two weeks in 1915 and was first premiered in Moscow that year. Originally received warmly by audiences, it was later banned during the rise of the Soviet Union, like most other religious music. The text is the "Ave Maria" ("Hail Mary") prayer and is sung in Church Slavonic. Rachmaninoff once said that it was one of his favorite choral pieces, and one that reminded him of his beloved Mother Russia. Be sure to enjoy the lovely long phrases, some of which sound like they are suspended in time. Also listen for the harmonic purity depicting the pure Mother of Christ. The alto and tenor sections often split into two parts, moving the text faster around suspended lines.

Warlock – Bethlehem Down

Philip Heseltine, known by the pseudonym of Peter Warlock (1894-1930) was a British composer and music critic. Though he had very little formal training, Warlock was influenced by Frederick Delius, the Dutch composer Bernard van Dieren, Elizabethan poetry, and all aspects of the Celtic culture. This carol "Bethlehem Down" was written in 1927. Though one would think it was written for a noble cause, it was actually written to finance a heavy Christmas Eve drinking session by Warlock and one of his friends. The poem is by Bruce Blunt. It is a beautiful and haunting piece, with a tender lilt and gentleness. A lovely writer for the voice, Warlock marries text and music quite well. Try to picture yourself in a great English cathedral listening to the beautiful sounds of this carol.
